


Here are our TOP TIPS for happy dressing up


When you choose a fancy dress costume, always start with what you already have available at home. What clothes do you have? What colours? You can then start to build up your costume by making props or accessories and adding some face-paint.

MAKING PROPS

- If an outfit seems really difficult to make, then think about making some props instead. Props are fun and can sometimes take an outfit to the next level!
- Think about the book character you want to be. You don't have to have a perfect outfit, but if it is Gangsta Granny for example, then she really needs a wig and glasses. Everything else can be mixed and matched depending on what you have at home.
- You can pretty much make any props using paper, a pencil and a stapler, as you will see from some of our suggestions.
- Gaffer tape and double-sided tape are extremely useful when making fancy dress costumes. They save a lot of time and are much less messy than glue. Sometimes, glue is the only way, for example gluing wool on to a Gangsta Granny wig, but otherwise strong tape is great.

WIGS

- All successful wigs start off by making a 'scalp' or a 'skull cap' as they are called, then the rest of it is easy, as it will always fit your head!
- Be inventive! If a wig has curly hair, then just cut rings off a cardboard roll and paint them, or cut strips of coloured paper and tape so you have a circle or make a paper chain for long curly hair.
- If the hair is frizzy, then fold paper strips like an accordion.
- For silver or white hair, you could use newspaper or white paper as cheaper options.
 - Cut up coloured plastic bags for crazy colours or dustbin bags for long witchy hair.



FACE-PAINTING

The trick with face-painting is to build up the 'face' in layers. Thinking about it like this will make it much easier. Think about the base colour, then the eyes and mouth details. Snazaroo face-paints are usually sold in bigger supermarkets.

ALWAYS MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD IS NOT ALLERGIC TO THE FACE-PAINTS.

HATS

Most hats are made in the same way, and often begin with a length of card that fits around the head and is stapled into place.
