

Dear Parents and Carers,

As we come to the end of a long "rainy" term, I would like to thank you for all the support you have given the school to help your children.

We have had many highlights this term but the KS1 Nativity and FS2 Tableau must be near the top. Watching our young children perform is such a joy and I see the same pleasure on your faces watching the achievement of your children.

We have had wonderful support from you at all our events this term, starting with Harvest through to Christingle, our music assembly and finally our Nativity and Tableau.

I continue to hear from other Head Teachers about the raising sickness within schools, of which we have had our fair share amongst children and staff. For this reason, I will taking the advice of Wokingham and increasing the quarantine time from **24 hours to 48 hours** following any case of vomiting or diarrhoea. I ask for your support to ensure that children are given this time to fully recover before returning to school. - **O** Once you've been symptom-free for at least 48 hours, you're safe to return to work, school or visit hospitals and care homes
- **R** Regularly wash your hands with soap and warm water, especially after using the toilet, and before eating or preparing food

O Only hand-washing will prevent spread of norovirus – alcohol hand gels DON'T kill the virus

All that remains is for me to wish each and every one of you a very Merry Christmas. On behalf of all the staff, thank you for your generous gifts.

Foundation Stage:

What another busy half term for the Foundation children and staff!

This half term we have based our Topic work around festivals and celebrations. We started off with Bonfire Night, learning about the story of Guy Fawkes and creating firework pictures using different materials. We then looked at the celebration of Diwali. We learnt about how people prepare for and celebrate Diwali and looked at the similarities and differences between festivals and celebrations. The children loved learning about the story of Rama and Sita and tried hard at using their phonic knowledge to write bits of the story. A firm favourite was creating diva lamps using clay. These were then decorated with bright colours and patterns.

A highlight of this half term was definitely the Natavity Tableau. We spent a couple of weeks learning about the story so that the children had a good understanding of what they were performing. We were so impressed with how the children performed on the day. They demonstrated such confidence and courage to get up on stage and sing their hearts out to a hall full of parents! They also looked fabulous in the costumes that you provided - thank you.

The children have had lots of fun over the last week or so creating lots of Christmas crafts. We hope that you will love them when your children bring them home on Friday.

In Maths we have been learning all about one more and one less. We are really pleased at how quickly the children have understood this concept. After Christmas we will be working on numbers 5-10 and learning the number bonds to 5.

We are amazed at how well the children are doing in Read Write Inc. It has been great to see them all trying their hardest. The children have all made progress and can at the very least read and write simple words. We do really appreciate your support with this at home.

Reminders - please remember to read with your child at least 5 times per week. Please sign the diary each time you have read so that we know to change your child's book.

Name labels - please ensure that your child's belongings are labelled. We find a lot of jumpers etc left around the classroom that are unnamed. These are very hard to then reunite with their owners!


We hope that you have a wonderful Christmas and look forward to welcoming you back for the Spring term in January.

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Key Stage 1:

This half term, KS1's topic is: Let's Celebrate! We have learnt about all sorts of different celebrations this half term including: Diwali, Bonfire Night, Eid, Christingle and Christmas. We have taken part in some fantastic investigations in Science. We have investigated what happens when you try to blow up a balloon using vinegar and bicarbonate of soda (hint: not just a messy classroom and some funny smells!) We have also made indoor firework lamps using oil, water and glitter and have explored the best environment for a flame to stay alight. In RE, the children have been looking at the concept of Saviours and thinking about the significance of Jesus's birth for Christians. In Art, we have designed and created some beautiful diva lamps out of clay and we have put our weaving skills to the test to make an Eid Star.



We have been focusing on our reading skills and learning how to proof read our work in our English lessons and I have been impressed with how the

children's reading is developing. In Maths, we have been very busy using all of our new resources and we have been using them to help with fractions and measuring.

The children have worked so hard on their Christmas play and we are amazed at how quickly they all learnt their lines and singing parts (Y2) and singing the songs (Y1 and Y2). They have been fantastic and we are very proud of them!

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Lower Key Stage 2:

In LKS2 we have travelled back in time to look at the lives of people living in the 'Stone Age.' The children have been looking at suitable evidence – what this would be and what it tells us about life so long ago. The children have really taken on the role of historians, asking interesting and impressive questions.

In English, we have been studying the book 'Stone Age Boy' by Satoshi Kitamura, using it to gain ideas of how people lived over 4000 years ago as well as using it as inspiration for imaginative description.

Maths has involved learning about fact families and the links between multiplication and division. We have been practising using the written method for multiplication and how long-multiplication is much less of a challenge if we know our times tables. We are encouraging the children to learn and retain their times tables using a range of strategies – chanting, singing, writing out and using memory techniques. We hope they are eager to go onto Mymaths, Sumdog and TT Rockstars, all of which are set up to help with this LKS2 challenge. The term has finished with learning about angles and properties of shapes. Lots of angle hunts and fun activities to be had within this subject.

Science has been all about rocks, fossils and soil. We learnt about the various types of rocks; looking more closely at fossils, their discovery and the life of Mary Anning. We have recently had the excitement of making our own

wormeries to learn how they mix and make good soil. It was a very hands-on lesson involving handling worms. All adults were impressed by the minimal squealing and the mature, scientific behaviour of the children. After our 2 weeks of observation, we will be releasing our worms onto the outdoor compost heap in the days prior to breaking up for the Christmas holidays.



It was a pleasure to see so many of you at the parent consultation evenings. It is lovely for us to discuss how the children have settled into their class groups and the routines of LKS2. It is a valuable time to update you on your child's learning and discuss how we can all help their education. Reading is so

important to a child's education and we are seeing great efforts at home to continue reading 5 times per week and signing the diary – keep it up! Another thank you needs to be issued to you all for the topic home-learning and your continued support. The children love telling us how they worked together with their grown-ups to make the amazing, and rich, models, fact files and pictures. We enjoy seeing them, along with videos and pictures. They are displayed with pride in the classrooms and corridors.

It was a pleasure to see so many of you were able to turn up to the Music assembly to see the Year 4s play their Ukuleles alongside the recorders. All musicians were rightly proud of their hard work, and efforts.

Finally, we would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a Happy Christmas, a relaxing and joyous holiday. We look forward to seeing the children in 2020!



In the last academic year, the PTA raised **£12,700** for the school which funded a number of school essentials such as netball posts, boot cleaners, Maths resources and the completion of the audio visual system in the hall. This is already getting positive feedback and we have just funded the Accelerated Readers programme for Key Stage 2 (due to go live April 2020).
